1 and paid month to month the same one-twelfth salary 2 he would ordinary receive as labor counsel. 3 So if there's any discussion on 4 Mr. Weber for labor counsel, 8a(2). 5 MR. HILL: Okay, this is Gary Hill. 6 I just wanted to commend the personnel committee for 7 the hard work they've been doing recently, and I 8 strongly support Mr. Weber's appointment for a 9 contract here. The City of Atlantic City is going through several milling and repaving throughout the city right now, and pretty much what we're doing with this particular contract is piggybacking off of the city, so there actually will be somewhat of a cost savings of us by not absorbing all the milling and paving that needs to be done on this particular work.

This, this portion is just the engineering portion of it where the design and layout will be done by the engineer.

MR. HILL: Right.

MR. CLAUDE SMITH: The construction aspect of it, of course, is later on. I think the estimated portion of the construction is about \$400,000 or so for that particular work to be done.

I'm recommending that we should go ahead with this because of the fact that once the city actually does any milling or restoration of any street in the City of Atlantic City they have a

25	What Mike has advised me, and I agree with him, is

right now we don't have a financial plan. Obviously with COVID-19, moving forward we need a financial analysis of where we're at now, where we're going to be in six months, where we're going to be at 18 months, where we're going to be at two years. That's real important. I think that's part of our mission.

And, also, you know, Mike has extensive background with this MUA. He now has -- currently he's working alongside other guys at ACUA, so I think he'll be a real asset to us moving forward and some guidance, more and above that we have now.

MR. BOR: Yeah, it's really a two-fold benefit to our Authority. One is, as Mr. Devlin indicated, we really should know where we're going in terms of revenue streams. It's very, very important. Also, as Andy would agree, since we've been in conversations with the State, it's also important I think for the State to be aware of the fact that this Board instead of just sitting still and waiting for the casinos to open, we're being proactive in terms of developing new revenue streams and illustrating that we will keep it going here both from the standpoint of operations and administration and finance.

So, hopefully, the Board agrees with

that. I know Andy probably does because we've discussed what we've got to do to show the State that we're ready, willing, able, and capable of keeping the ball going.

CHAIRMAN DEVLIN: And we're not sitting on our hands.

MR. WEBER: I would agree with you on that, Fred. There's a lot of hard decisions to make. We need someone like Mr. Goloff to help us with that.

CHAIRMAN DEVLIN: Mike.

MR. BOR: Mr. Goloff.

MR. GOLOFF: Okay. Good morning to everybody who's here and on the telephone. I had the pleasure of speaking with John and Fred, and I said to them I think that at this point I've done about 40 PPP applications with some other things with the COVID SBA loans that are available. And part of the stuff that's available is also available to government entities.

The problem at this point is that they have requests that far exceed the amount of money that's available. So I think what they're trying to do now is they're trying to say, Okay, how do we scale these things back so we can at least do

something for everybody that applies.

So what I was saying the other day was, I think you need to get ahold of, at a minimum, you know, where you are now cash wise, and I understand that the cash flow is severely diminished.

CHAIRMAN DEVLIN: Correct.

MR. GOLOFF: And then, you know, see what you can expect and then see what the actual fixed costs are. And one of the fixed costs is going to definitely be the employees and continuing to pay them.

I know some private companies are giving people reduced pay with the promise to catch it up later and things of that nature. And you need to really evaluate what you have, how long can you go, and what's available. And what I started to do also is, I started also to tell people cause, just because of experience, as you do more you get more comfortable with it and see what the realities are.

Not only I think should we be applying potentially for any PPP help that we can do, I think maybe because it's going to be much faster, you might want to apply at the same time to whoever the MUA does their banking with and say, Hey, can we get a -- I don't know -- a half million,

three-quarters of a million, I don't know what the number is at this point, but a line of credit so we can draw on it as needed until we get the PPP or other funds in place.

Within the last week, also, the treasury has come out with a \$2.3 million availability, but they don't have a plan yet. So I actually got emailed from somebody who was -- they have a large company, so they were asking to give some input on what you think would be helpful to people. And I got -- I was lucky enough to be able to put a little input on that. And the first thing I put in was a quick method for public agencies because I know with private you got credit scores and all those other things to consider, but public agencies like this, once things are back to normal and the water is flowing again, then you can start billing again.

So I think organizations like this should be treated a little more quickly and efficiently and money get to them because, you know, the other thing that you'd have to balance is, if you were to lay people off and everybody applied for unemployment today, they wouldn't see any money for three or four weeks probably if things went quickly

because the system is overburdened and it's breaking down. And they just announced in today's paper that they're fixing some certain things.

So, you know, I can help with all those things and I'd be happy to help. It's nice to see some familiar faces, whether I give out turkeys with you perhaps, or worked alongside of you many moons ago, and to see some new faces or faces that I know that weren't here when I was here last because I think it's been at least 10 years, if not a little bit longer. So I welcome the opportunity and I will do my absolute best if you guys call on me to help.

CHAIRMAN DEVLIN: Anybody have any questions for Mr. Goloff that he's here now?

MR. HILL: This is Gary Hill. I just wanted to say that I know Mr. Goloff. I've worked with him on many things. In all disclosure, he's also a -- our vice president at MBC -- I'm sorry, our treasurer of MBCA. But that is what I'm saying. He has a very good reputation. He's been our treasurer for over 30 years -- almost 30 years. He's done an excellent and very professional job. But I wanted to make sure I put that on the record. CHAIRMAN DEVLIN: Thank you,

Apparently in October 2018, I believe it was, the Board approved a resolution for Mr. DeCotiis's firm for \$50,000 to review RFPs for the solar. I don't know why you'd get a lawyer to review RFPs for the solar, but the problem wasn't so much the approval of the 60,000, it was the failure to approve what the hourly rate would be not to exceed it.

Now, we've taken the unprecedented step in my eleven years here of -- with Mike Goloff -- of saying to him, yes, you have a ceiling of 50, but it's at a certain hourly rate. We never did that before.

MS. BAILEY: Okay.

MR. BOR: So we were just paying bills not to exceed, but we didn't know what the bills were. So I pulled Mr. Frino's account regarding the review of RFPs, which I don't even know what that is, and I saw that his billing for his work was 395 an hour, so no wonder it was 60 real fast.

So I think if the Board agrees, we're now going to have more oversight with Mr. Riley, as the chairman just suggested, and I

reviewing things; that we just can't let people just bill. And we've taken the first step today because we've allowed Mr. Goloff not to exceed, but also included in the resolution what his hourly fee must be so we don't have another 395 an hour like we had for Frino for a long period of time.
