12 MR. BOR: Mr. Cheatham?

13 MR. CHEATHAM: Here.

1 MR. BOR: Quoram. I assume the Board
2 has received a copy of our last set of minutes. If
3 they've been read and if there are any questions,
4 please come forward. If not, is there a motion?

5 MR. HILL: Motion to accept.

6 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second.

7 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

8 MR. LEA: Yes.

9 MR. BOR: Colanzi?

10 MR. COLANZI: Yes.

11 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

12 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

13 MR. BOR: Hill?

7 Board that repair has been completed?

8 MR. ARSENIS: Correct.

9 MR. HILL: I'll move 8.a.

10 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second.

11 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

12 MR. LEA: Yes.

13 MR. BOR: Colanzi?

14 MR. COLANZI: Yes.

15 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

16 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

17 MR. BOR: Hill?

18 MR. HILL: Yes.

21 What is the amount?

23 MR. SMITH: Yes, okay.

1 MR. SMITH: That's what I thought it
2 was, \$714.

3 MR. BOR: \$714. We have -- we had a
4 second, but let me go through roll call again.

5 Mr. Lea?

6 MR. LEA: Yes.

7 MR. BOR: Colanzi?

8 MR. COLANZI: Yes.

9 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

10 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

11 MR. BOR: Hill?

12 MR. HILL: Yes.

13 MR. BOR: Smith?

14 MR. SMITH: Yes.

15 MR. BOR: Carries.

16 MR. WARD: Your abatement has been
17 approved. You can get further information at the
18 window and information will be sent to you.

19 MR. ARSENIS: Thank you. Have a good
20 day.

21 MR. WARD: Okay. Proceeding with the
22 report, the Executive Director. We have received
23 correspondence from the Metropolitan Business and
24 Civic Association having its 25th year installation
25 awards gala. Am I correct in saying that Mr. Pinky

1 Kravitz will be honored?

2 MR. HILL: Is being honored, yes.

3 MR. WARD: For all of his years on the
4 radio, so that is first.

5 Second, I received from the Chelsea
6 Neighborhood Association for an affair called the
7 Taste of Chelsea. It's going to be held at the
8 Chelsea Hotel on September the 24th.

9 The Board will recall that a Mr. Lyle
10 Mason had come to the Authority with respect to his
11 issues with sewer bills. I wanted to report that I
12 spoke with Mr. Mason and also wrote a letter, which I
13 copied him on the letter, and I also spoke with
14 Walter Miller of the Atlantic City Sewerage Company
15 and explained the circumstance, because Mr. Mason has
16 a rather large bill with the sewerage company, which
17 resulted as a clump of his billings for quarters or
18 months that were not billed. And Mr. Miller, of the
19 sewerage company, is going to work with Lyle on a
20 payment plan, a reasonable payment plan to spread out
21 his billing.

22 MR. SMITH: This was the gentleman who
23 was here last month?

24 MR. WARD: Yes, the gentleman who was
25 here. So I wrote to him and gave him the name of the

1 gentleman, spoke with Mr. Miller, hopefully that
2 would help to resolve his issue.

3 MR. SMITH: Very good.

4 MR. HILL: Thank you.

5 MR. WARD: Yesterday I attended a
6 meeting, which was put together by AC DevCo.
7 AC DevCo is a nonprofit organization that was
8 spearheaded by the State to perhaps pursue a
9 direction for the City's redevelopment under the
10 model that was used in New Brunswick.

11 The individuals talked about two
12 projects with multiple components. One of which is
13 the Albany Avenue sector, where hopefully if Stockton
14 is successful in its sale of the Showboat, then
15 Stockton will build a new campus on the former site
16 of the high school, along with student housing,
17 circulating in that area, taking out the old Eldridge
18 storage building and perhaps even the Studebaker
19 building.

20 In addition in that area, DevCo
21 announced that the South Jersey Gas Company would be
22 building a facility and relocate its corporate
23 offices from Hammonton back into Atlantic City.

24 The other project that they mentioned
25 that they have been working on is at the Ohio and

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 Atlantic Avenue area, where Rowan University has been
2 slated to build a medical school for osteopathic
3 medicine, as well as housing for physician students
4 and perhaps even nurses and other employees of the
5 hospital. In addition on that site, they believe
6 they have a commitment from AtlantiCare to relocate
7 its corporate offices from the Pomona area back into
8 the City. So we of course here at the Authority are
9 hopeful that these developments take place. In fact,
10 they indicated that shovels could be in the ground by
11 March of 2016.

12 We still have our fingers crossed for
13 Atlantic Club and the Showboat to be repurposed.

14 I reported last week, in fact the Board
15 approved for the Authority to work through an
16 easement for the Department of Transportation, which
17 is purchasing a portion of the former Gateway
18 project, and that's in Pleasantville near the
19 expressway. Purchase would be for the purpose of
20 depositing spoils from a number of bays and for
21 dredging spoils that would go there. The requirement
22 of the easement is to allow for access, and it's
23 become a little bit more complicated because of
24 Atlantic City Electric, which of course owns the gate
25 and the roadway, but Atlantic City Electric is also

1 planning on replacing wooden light poles with steel
2 poles, so there is perhaps going to be a lot of
3 activity there. We're concerned that our areas and
4 our features with respect to our 48-inch pipe would
5 not be disturbed in any way. There is also a
6 rebuilding of a bridge that we use in order to get
7 access from one side of the pipe to another, so we're
8 slowing down on this. We're not rushing. We're
9 having the input of our plant staff, which monitors
10 this area, take our time to figure out the best means
11 for this. We're also updating the fees that we would
12 need to recover for our staff to go out and monitor
13 access, open and close gates and so forth and so on.

14 MR. SMITH: Don't we have cameras still
15 on that area? Don't we have cameras still on that
16 area?

17 MR. WARD: I don't believe we have any
18 cameras out in the marshes. No, we don't have
19 cameras in the marshes.

20 MR. MOYLE: Wiped out in Sandy. They
21 didn't show the whole pipeline.

22 MR. SMITH: We did have --

23 MR. MOYLE: At night they were useless.

24 MR. SMITH: I know that, but we did
25 have coverage out there, that I recall. What

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 happened to it?

2 MR. MOYLE: Got wiped out in Sandy.

3 MR. HILL: Sandy knocked them out.

4 MR. SMITH: And we didn't do anything
5 about that?

6 MR. MOYLE: We started to. Again, it's
7 just called from one fire to the next. I mean, it's
8 again, at nighttime they were useless.

9 MR. SMITH: I wasn't aware we got
10 knocked out.

11 MS. BAILEY: Who was receiving that
12 additional funds from our manpower going out there?
13 Who would be paying that?

14 MR. WARD: The Department of
15 Transportation is responsible for the dredging
16 project. They would use subcontractors. So the
17 easement would contain language that the
18 subcontractors that they hire would have to pay for
19 and bid, include that in their bid for our services.

20 MS. BAILEY: Okay.

21 MR. WARD: And I went back to 2002,
22 which was the last time that a dredging had occurred.
23 And Bill McCleese, who was the deputy in Garth's
24 position, had set forth a protocol for how they go
25 out, so we are updating that protocol. But again

1 with the Atlantic Electric piece, we have to
2 integrate their needs and, you know, we have Lloyd
3 Levenson on the side of the Gateway, and at the same
4 time the electric company and also the DOT and us, so
5 it's a four-party negotiation, which we play a major
6 part in.

7 MS. BAILEY: Thank you.

8 MR. WARD: I think I also need to
9 advise the Board of the building, formerly known as
10 Revel. Revel has become behind in both its sewer and
11 its water bills, I'm advised by the sewer company,
12 that they also have not paid ACR electric. I have
13 been in touch with the sewer company, fire department
14 of Atlantic City, also the attorneys for Revel,
15 because it becomes a sensitive issue when a building
16 of this size could go dark in terms of electricity,
17 could go dark in terms of water for fire protection.
18 We do know that there are two laterals feeding water
19 into the building. One is for domestic, one is for
20 fire, but I would not take the fire down at any point
21 until -- we wouldn't take the fire down. We just
22 have to stay with the fire department.

23 Ms. Bazemore has, of course, registered
24 our lien with respect to our outstanding water with
25 the City of Atlantic City, so we're hopeful that we

1 would get paid.

2 MR. HILL: How much is it for, Linda?

3 MS. BAZEMORE: About 45,000.

4 MR. HILL: Okay.

5 MS. BAZEMORE: And that's just the
6 quarterly flat. They're not using water in the
7 facility, so that's just the flat charges.

8 MR. HILL: Right, right.

9 MR. SMITH: I was under the impression
10 that those lawyers was looking into that because the
11 electricity is connected right to the building, and
12 it's not being able to get access to that or
13 something?

14 MR. WARD: They keep going back and
15 forth to court, because electricity is necessary to
16 keep the light on at the top of the building for --

17 MR. SMITH: Understood.

18 MR. WARD: -- airplanes. Other
19 electricity in order to run the air handling system
20 would be necessary to preserve the asset, because as
21 you go from season to season, if you're not moving
22 that air around --

23 MR. SMITH: Understood.

24 MR. WARD: -- all of a sudden you're
25 going to get mold and that kind of infestation.

1 MR. SMITH: I thought he was taking
2 care of that, Straub, what is it name, Straub? I
3 thought he was taking care of it.

4 MR. CHEATHAM: He don't want to pay the
5 bills.

6 MR. WARD: I just want the Board to be
7 aware that we are working closely with the fire
8 department. So that would conclude that portion.

9 4.b would be the financial report. Any
10 questions, observations on the financial report? Ms.
11 Bazemore, any highlights?

12 MS. BAZEMORE: Just a few pointers I
13 wanted to mention. You have the financials for the
14 month ending July 31st. The revenues for this year
15 compared to last year, if you take a look at the
16 report, it is lower for the primary reason of
17 connection fees. Last year we had connection fees of
18 approximately \$400,000. This year, around this time,
19 however, this year is only about 43,000, so when
20 Bruce mentioned prior that construction is coming
21 into the City and potential new business, that would
22 be a huge benefit for us.

23 When you look at the revenues compared
24 to budget, we are pretty much in line. It's just
25 under slightly by about \$30,000, which I definitely

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 expect us to meet our budget for this year.

2 Also if you look at our receivable
3 balance compared to last year, you'll notice that
4 it's higher and one of the reasons, Bruce just
5 mentioned regarding Revel, receivable that's
6 outstanding, but a huge chunk of it is City bills
7 that I just wanted to mention. We have not been paid
8 by the City of Atlantic City. It's \$145,000 that's
9 out there. And at some point we need to consider
10 going forward, do we continue to bill, what the
11 situation will be. So I just wanted to highlight
12 that point.

13 And while we're on the topic of the
14 City, you will notice in your bill list for the
15 month, it's about \$1.2 million and that's because the
16 City municipal appropriation of 690,000 is included.
17 So we'll be releasing a check to the City. I
18 contacted the State --

19 MR. SMITH: Linda, slow down. We don't
20 release that check until the budget is approved.

21 MS. BAZEMORE: That's what I was about
22 to say. I was on the phone with the State just
23 confirming, because our policy in the past, do not
24 release until the budget is adopted. I spoke to two
25 individuals at the Department of Community Affairs

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 and they're under the persuasion it's fine to
2 release. So I said, Could you send something in
3 writing? She didn't want to do that.

4 MR. SMITH: You got to cover that due
5 bill against --

6 MS. BAZEMORE: We'll be releasing that
7 check.

8 MR. HILL: A question with the Harrah's
9 Convention Center opening up tomorrow. We obviously
10 -- they had connection fees and everything.

11 MS. BAZEMORE: Most likely in '14.

12 MR. HILL: It was in '14?

13 MR. MOYLE: It's been a while. The
14 nice one about that, they can never get a refund
15 because they hooked into the same meters. There is
16 no way to tell and that's written into the service
17 agreement.

18 MR. HILL: Okay.

19 MR. MOYLE: I hope. You never know.

20 MR. SMITH: I want to step back for a
21 minute or so. I wasn't aware, I don't know if the
22 Board Members was aware of our cameras being down.
23 Don't we have insurance for that kind of stuff? I
24 mean, we're paying insurance. Is our equipment
25 insured?

1 MR. MOYLE: Again, we got a pretty good
2 sized deductible too.

3 MR. SMITH: But what I'm trying to say,
4 has anybody looked into it?

5 MR. MOYLE: We did.

6 MS. BAZEMORE: All of our known issues,
7 I don't know the cameras being included. We did
8 communicate the larger problems that we had with the
9 main in the area. And like Garth said, our
10 deductible was so high, but I don't remember really
11 including the cameras.

12 MR. SMITH: One other thing. The doors
13 out here, they've been out of control now for three
14 months or -- you know, the doors you guys push the
15 buttons and have the doors open automatically.
16 What's up with that?

17 MR. WARD: Which doors.

18 MR. MOYLE: I guess these.

19 MR. SMITH: The front door. Look into
20 it. I thought Willard was in charge of it or you,
21 Garth.

22 MR. MOYLE: I haven't heard of it.
23 Again, I don't use it.

24 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: The first one is out
25 of commission. The second one is still operating.

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 MR. SMITH: No, neither one of them is
2 working.

3 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Since this morning?

4 MR. SMITH: Yeah, I don't know how long
5 it's been, but I know a couple haven't.

6 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: I know the front one
7 is out of commission in terms of the operation from
8 the front desk, but the second one, as far as I know,
9 it is still operable.

10 MR. SMITH: Let's get it checked.

11 MS. JOHNSON: The inside one works.

12 MR. WARD: If we want to, just because
13 of this discussion, switch to 8.c. vulnerability
14 analysis.

15 MS. BAZEMORE: Can I in 30 seconds
16 mention to the Board, I just wanted to end, it's
17 budget season. So it's time, we're starting to work
18 on our 2016 budget. An assumption is business as
19 usual and so we'll be setting up meetings for Gary
20 and John probably for the end of the month.

21 MR. WARD: We have been meeting also
22 with our insurance company for workers' compensation.

23 MS. BAZEMORE: They have offered to
24 provide and work with us on a vulnerability analysis.
25 And they're going to make certain suggestions based

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 on a walk-through of certain areas that we could
2 retrofit or upgrade in order to reduce the
3 probability of an incident. So I have planned on
4 having a notice to you today to let you know
5 throughout this budget process, we're going to be
6 prioritizing areas that we think we can upgrade,
7 things like the SCADA systems, things like cameras.
8 We have to budget for it. We have to see what we can
9 afford and make those adjustments to improve, but
10 again --

11 MR. SMITH: I will suggest you do it
12 just like business is going to continue going on as
13 it is.

14 MR. WARD: Absolutely.

15 MR. SMITH: Make sure we use the money
16 that we need to keep operable. Just don't listen to
17 the rhetoric. Keep doing what we've been doing and
18 our job.

19 MR. HILL: Have you been in contact
20 with the new auditor?

21 MS. BAZEMORE: Yes, we have, yeah. We
22 had some e-mails going back and forth and they wanted
23 to some preliminary work.

24 MR. HILL: That's what I meant.

25 MS. BAZEMORE: I asked that it be done

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 once we introduce our budget so I could focus on what
2 they need.

3 MR. HILL: Thank you.

4 MR. WARD: Okay. 4.c shut offs. Shut
5 off list is available. Any questions?

6 4.d personnel committee meeting. I'd
7 just like to add a footnote, that our new assistant
8 director Mr. Cianfrani has appeared to really knit
9 himself into the procedure. He's handling a lot of
10 the assignments out of the gate.

11 MR. SMITH: We're satisfied with him?

12 MR. MOYLE: Yeah, so far.

13 MR. WARD: We're satisfied, yes, we
14 are.

15 MR. SMITH: Very good. Good work.
16 Garth finally got somebody to work with.

17 MR. WARD: Good man. I think we got a
18 good one.

19 Five, Director's Forum, Directors?

20 MR. SMITH: I had my say. Anything
21 else?

22 MR. WARD: Okay. Public Participation,
23 anyone from the public?

24 Number 7, Old Business. A.(1) on meter
25 transmission units. We will not proceed with a

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 resolution at this time. We're going to have to have
2 a critical discussion over the bids that came in.
3 There were two systems that could work, but they're
4 different price differentials, and the manner in
5 which they could work are different. One of which is
6 a link to our current Aclara system. The other is
7 the Sensus system, which would involve more
8 integration. We have to have a critical discussion
9 over this and we'll bring this back to the Board.

10 Engineering, Mr. Smith?

11 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Good morning. In
12 regards to the ASR well, at least we're a little
13 closer to closing this project out. Again, we
14 finally got all our spare parts. We had a few
15 defective ones that we had to return and exchange and
16 received the replacement, so we're good.

17 On one good note, the engineering
18 company, which is actually Hazen and Sawyer, would
19 like to submit an abstract in regards to presenting
20 the entire project -- well, not the entire project
21 but the ASR well project at the AWWA national
22 conference, which would either be this year or the
23 following year, and that's dependent upon whether or
24 not they submit the abstract, if it's accepted or if
25 it's actually rejected, but it's a good thing for the

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 Authority because at least it's showing the positive
2 of what we're actually doing and it's a benefit for
3 us in terms of publication that would be out there
4 and of course the notoriety that we would probably
5 get from doing this particular project. So I don't
6 have any answers for you right now in regards to how
7 it will proceed, but once the abstract is actually
8 submitted, it has to go through a panel and once it's
9 accepted, then we'll know whether or not we'll go
10 forth with the actual presentation of it. It could
11 be a joint venture. It could be just the engineering
12 that would do the actual presentation of it at the
13 conference.

14 In regards to the cradles, just waiting
15 on the report back from the environmentalist. I have
16 been in touch with her. It's just a matter of
17 getting that report out. Once that report is out,
18 DEP actually reviews it, accepts it and approves it.
19 That project will be closed out. There is no issues
20 with it. It's just a matter of the fundamentals that
21 we have to go through and the process that we have to
22 go through to get that project closed out.

23 The one million gallon tank, I'm not
24 sure if you're aware, but we did actually submit for
25 engineering bids. We did receive several engineering

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 bids. PS&S was actually selected. They did come out
2 and do an inspection. We're waiting for that
3 inspection report to come through and then we'll
4 proceed with probably doing the plans and
5 specifications. I guess the one hitch on that, how
6 we're going to be funding that. And I think that's
7 something we're going to have to further discuss,
8 whether it be at an engineering meeting or myself and
9 Linda at our, you know, coming to the Board and
10 discussing it further, okay.

11 Two million gallon tank, we're just
12 waiting for, if you want to call it, some punch list
13 items that would to be corrected and done. And once
14 that's actually done, we're waiting for the paint to
15 actually come in. Hopefully that would be in next
16 week, contractor come in, complete that work and
17 close that out, as well too.

18 Solar, I'll turn it over to Mr. Ward so
19 he can discuss that.

20 MR. WARD: 7.b.(5), solar with the FAA.
21 The FAA has a monthly meeting with the environmental
22 team, which is always held on a Wednesday. There
23 have been a couple of Wednesdays which have
24 conflicted with our Board meeting. Basically, now
25 that the FAA is going to proceed with a solar project

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 to include floating solar on our reservoirs, the FAA
2 has agreed to move their Wednesday meeting to either
3 a Tuesday or a Thursday so that I could be in
4 attendance for that, because that's going to be a key
5 component in terms of both the installation and some
6 of the sensitive environmental issues that appear at
7 the FAA. So again, that project is slated to go out
8 to bid the first quarter of 2016, okay.

9 Under New Business, we've already
10 concluded 8.a.(1). We perhaps can continue with
11 8.a.(2) and (3) together. These are unnecessary to
12 appear.

13 MR. MCGETTIGAN: I'll make a motion.

14 MR. COLANZI: Second.

15 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

16 MR. LEA: Yes.

17 MR. BOR: Colanzi?

18 MR. COLANZI: Yes.

19 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

20 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

21 MR. BOR: Hill?

22 MR. HILL: Yes.

23 MR. BOR: Smith?

24 MR. SMITH: Yes.

25 MR. BOR: Carries for abatements (2)

ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 and (3).

2 MR. WARD: 8.b.(1), the Authority
