My guess he will not be able to get that going back

reciprocal, but even if we are successful going forward

if would be a huge benefit for us

Mr. Devlin: And that is something that a former state monitor was pushing for too. That was actually his idea. Rob Long remember?

Mr. Bor: Well, Rob was the one that first put into my mind, how come you guys are paying taxes in Pleasantville and Egg Harbor. So, this has come to fruition and we are on appeal and hopefully we are successful.

Now, with regard to the resolution concerning the amendment. We may recall initially Mr. Gallagher was hired on November 18, 2020 to process the appeals and the approval was for him to receive 150 dollars an hour, but not to exceed \$15,000. I am informed by Anita that he is either there or just below based on his present invoice.

So, we are asking the board to continue the

relationship, but to move the 15 to 20 thousand and it is only a \$5,000 differential, but my preference is to amend, if we have to, rather then to give to long of a leash. Because lawyers tend to bill what they can.

From my standpoint I would rather move it from 15 to 20 and if he goes over that and he is doing a good job and progressing we could always revisit it.

So that resolution would continue under number 143 except move the ceiling from 15 to \$20,000 and if there is any discussion then let's hear it.

         We are kind of working around that and we are

    moving forward and a lot of work has been done at our
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project. Claude can give us a quick update. It is a little complicated, but now that all the contracts are signed and delivered we are moving forward with supplies and chemicals that we need.

So, far and knock on wood, so far so good, but we did have some supply issues which is common. Claude would you like to?

Mr. Smith: Sure. Good morning everyone. Just an update for the progress that we are actually making with the PFAS. We are still moving along at a pretty rapid pace. That is the best that we can do in order to fulfill the schedule that has been presented to us for PFAS.

Like Gary mentioned we are having issues. Well, the contractors were having issues with the nature of the fittings, which are a 90 degree elbow of the construction for the piping system. The piping treatment that is being done.

Of course, we normally spec domestic products as opposed to foreign products and of course sometimes when you do spec domestic products as opposed to foreign products they are a little bit harder to obtain, but eventually they were able to obtain it. So, they are moving forward with that particular tree configuration that they are doing.

We are expecting delivery of the granulated activated carbon or GAC on November 8 and 9th, and that will complete carbon delivery that we need for the six vessels that are at the location. Then of course they are going to have start doing some back washing.

Well, that is in the future because they still have to complete the work that they are doing on the well in terms of changing out the column and get the configuration done for the insulation of the piping for the connection to the vessels from the well itself, but again we are moving forward and doing the best that we can regarding that.

We also have in addition to that work that is going on and this is part of the PFAS as well and that is the insulation of the horizontal drilling conduit for the electrical work that we need to do for the complete loop connection of the electrical wiring up at that location. That should be staring sometime soon.

As a matter of fact, that should be starting

November 1st. There will be a little overlap of work

being done simultaneously, but at the same time we will

coordinate as best that we can to make sure that neither

of the contractors are compromised as far as work that

needs to be done.

Upon the conduit being installed of course we have

to come back and start looking at installing all of the 1 2 electrical and that is something that we will have to 3 talk about later in regards to pricing and the methodology and how we go about doing that work, but 4 5 just for everyone's peace of mind we are moving ahead 6 with that as best that we can. 7 Like I said, sampling will be schedule for next 8 month to see pretty much where we are in order for the 9 PFAS compliancy and that is pretty much it. 10 Mr. Devlin: Who is the Petrongolo? 11 Mr. Smith: Petrongolo Water Contractor are doing 12 the water replacement. 13 Mr. Hill: There is also something on here for 14 TIGG, which is on our project list. 15 Mr. Smith: Yes. 16 Mr. Devlin: How about Philip Ross? 17 Mr. Hill: Philip Ross is one or our contractors.

Mr. Smith: Phillip Ross or PR is part of the PFAS and TIGG is also part of the PFAS and Petrongolo is actually doing one of our water-main replacement.

You should also probably see one under Lafayette as you are going through your signatures, and that is also for water-main replacement.

Claude and I went and got an award at H2M for the MUA working together. Working for the project which is very nice. From what I am understanding and I was away, it is a very important award for the City. They get State recognition. Does anyone want to comment?

Mr. Armstrong: This is really nice of them, and they are going to be providing us with pictures and we actually took pictures with them and they will be provided to us.

Mr. Hill: We should put them on the website.

Mr. Devlin: When I first got here I said, we should get a little trophy case. There are a lot of cool stuff around and to have some at the plant.

I just think that maybe at the boards expense maybe get a trophy case or glass case for stuff like that and there is some really cool stuff around this area.

We have some old time plaques that they have at the plant and they have value. If the board is good with it we can put it out there.

Mr. Hill: I also wanted to say that during the process of this project and bringing everybody in they have been taking photos and we got a report. Not a report, but a video thing of all the things which we can use eventually down the road. For the public's input this is what we did. I suggested that the work that we

did at our work session meeting we had that eventually we should show it to City Council and make sure they know that we are not sitting here doing nothing.

This is what we are doing and this is where the money is going and also for the State and of course the State will get a copy of that, but it is really interesting thing to see the scope of this project. So that is something we can do down the line.

Mr. Smith: Someone did mention that.

Mr. Hill: Yes. Put it on the website.

Mr. Smith: And we have a web page now.

Mr. Hill: Michael, did you have anything?

Mr. Armstrong: Yes. Just a couple of things. I have been involved since the beginning and it is remarkable to me the level of cooperation that we are seeing. Remember at the time we were all worried about how we are going to get this under way.

Mr. Hill: And that is the key.

Mr. Riley: That is the key. The project manager that runs our meeting every week is like no nonsense and very bright and very talented person. As a lawyer watching all of these engineers and listening, it make my head explode.

We are in really good hands on this and I think both locally and nationally this project has some

significance because of the size of it and the quality of the work that has been done by our technical engineering staff. I am impressed and Michael has done a lot of construction work in his career and I have not, but I sit back and I listen and to me it is truly impressive and it make your realize that once you get the right people in the right spot you can fix anything and I think that is where we are.

Mr. Hill: We are trying to address that. We are lucky to have this and we have our consultant Mr. Palladino and Michael looking over as our attorneys for the contracts. So everybody is working together with our plant manager. So Michael is right it is really a big project and Claude should be very happy.

Mr. Smith: I just want to add to that. I know that Gary did speak about that, of course, the recognition that we received, but I just want to make us understand from the construction and engineer aspect of it that this is good recognition for the Authority in regards of this being presented at the award because of the fact that they are really showcasing projects that are going on throughout New Jersey and it is of significance and it does mean a lot.

It is a plug for us to be a part of this and to be recognized as well too and not just engineers, but what

we have been doing in regards to getting this particular project done.

Mr. Armstrong: I just want everybody to understand that the work is being done, but when we finish this project the work will just begin. This is just a temporary fix. The real work will begin in coming up with the money to build the plant and Claude told me the other day that even though this puts us in place we have no idea how long it will last.

Mr. Devlin: No offense. That is why I encourage board members to go out to the plant because until you see that and how old that it is and the infrastructure. That changed my opinion.

Mr. Smith: I will address that with a different issue.

Mr. Devlin: Mr. Banfield, what happen to our personnel meeting?

Mr. Armstrong: I can update you on the personnel committee meeting and where we left off. We were supposed to get all the job descriptions and compile them for the personnel committee members and we did that.

We provided it to Mr. Banfield and we provided it to Nynell and the volume of it was so significant. It is more than 150 pages and no one was able to get though

it on time to have a meaningful discussion about it 1 2 Mr. Devlin: I did not get my copy yet. Mr. Smith: Well, Siracusa is the one, but he is the one that presents the insurance policies to us in regards to the amounts and what the coverage is. He might be a broker, but not necessarily lobbying on behalf of the Authority for receiving proposals or putting out proposals.

Mr. Devlin: I thought that guy was excessive and everyone did to in doing RPs. Can we do an RP to hire a broker?

Mr. Armstrong: I think you have to do an RP to hire a broker. Just like we do for financial advisers, attorneys or anybody else on our behalf. Mr. Hill: Why do I think that the name was Brengle. It has been my experience and it was tested in Willingboro, Alaimo & Associates handles that and we don't deal -- it was my experience that they come and report and talk about issues before they arise and Mike can attest to that and we don't have that here.

Mr. Devlin: Does that not fall under Anthony Palumbi? Is that his name?

Mr. Armstrong: He is not an engineer though. As a matter of fact when I met with Anthony and some of it does, but when I met with him and that is why we have WMR to assist him and they talk about software that can tract, but he also asked himself for an engineering firm. That is why we brought H2M in.

They indicated they could assist in the regard. In my opinion it is absolutely necessary. When you get out there Anthony is going to respond by saying I need to order parts. The engineer is gonna say it is time to stop ordering parts and it is time to buy the new car. Do you know what I mean or is there something new out

See what else you can do. 1 There are 2 alternatives. There are cheaper ways to go. I think at 3 some point we need to engage an engineering firm to 4 check things and I know that Vince does to, but to the 5 extent that H2M -- I know that we have to do an RP, but given their background and experience we had them 6 7 assemble a meeting because we were dealing with PFAS and 8 he has some emergency issues related to PFAS and we also 9 had to look at that. So it does not effect us.

That they can help us right away so that is does not interfere with the progress that we are making, but they did submit something indicated they would be able to send to us.

I told Claude that it should go out in an RP and let everyone know the response if we get a more competitive price.

Mr. Devlin: So what would the title of that be? Engineering firm like an engineering consultant?

Mr. Armstrong? Engineering, yes.

Mr. Devlin: Is there a policy on doing that now?

Mr. Armstrong: Well ---

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Mr. Devlin: And he is just doing that one project?

Mr. Armstrong: No. His expertise is not, as I understand it, and that is why he bought in H2M. He himself told us. He can apply for it if he believes it

Instead of buying a generator that is water proof or salt proof because we have a ton of erosion here they have a compressor, and I was wondering, and I looked and it is totally rusted and I am like guys. And the City falls on this too.

We buy just the bare minimum. They don't have the warranty package and that mind set and I explained to even Claude that saving that money means we are saving pennies, but losing dollars and one day we are gonna fall on our face

Mr. Armstrong: That is what I am worried about.

Mr. Devlin: Back-up generators and you know well they are from prior World War 11, and I mean they are cool that they are still working, but come on man.

So I think as a board and as an administration we need to work together to really do some structural renovations. I mean even to the buildings. Some of them boards, I mean, come on guys. I know that I hit it hard with security, but I think overall the infrastructure out there -- I mean they have that one

tower that has not been used since the 80s. It is crazy.

Mr. Armstrong: When you consider the fact that we have to build a new plant anyway I thing it is important to have an assessment. They know what we need to do with respect to that. So they may say okay we put a Band-Aid on this because we know down the road we have to get a new car anyway.

So they have that knowledge, but that is what an engineering firm is supposed to do. They are suppose to tell you whether or not it worth fixing.

Mr. Devlin: We don't do that now.

Mr. Armstrong: The thing that really scares me is the fact that now we can't get parts. We have to have them specifically fabricated and it takes a year. The only solution I am aware of if we keep doing that that means we have to get extra parts fabricated. One has to be in the process --

Mr. Armstrong: They are expensive because they are being specifically fabricated for us because they no longer make parts.

Mr. Devlin: That is crazy. Just going out there I want everybody to do that. Those engines alone and the backup generators Mac does not even make them.

Like you mentioned before our plant facility is ancient and old. It has not been maintained correctly over the years, and we are aware of that, and we are pretty much, right now, on a string in regards to our operation for the treatment plant facility.

So when you say what is our five-year plan maybe you should say what is our one-year plan. Okay.

Mr. Devlin: We know our one-year plan and it is PFAS.

Mr. Smith: The reason I say the one-year plan is because of the fact that our facility is old and it is so old. Okay. We have to more that likely revamp that entire treatment plant. Not be sarcastic.

Mr. Devlin: No. I agree with you.

Mr. Smith: In terms of our one-year plan because one year down the road we are looking at trying to have a new treatment facility that can facilitate.

Mr. Devlin: One year down the road you are thinking?

Mr. Armstrong: We may have to.

Mr. Devlin: Let me ask you this, City wise, because I know we have some of the oldest pipes. I have seen it myself, but I also heard around from different entities. What is our plan?

Mr. Smith: We have a yearly replacement plan in regards to water-main replacement. As a matter of fact, I am gonna let you kind of segway into that because I saw the chart that you have.

Because of the fact that we are doing yearly replacements this is something that is required by the Water Quality Accountability Act. We have to do at least a mile of water-main replacement on a yearly basis.

We have been doing replacements, as a matter of fact, you just mentioned about the who was that check for and so forth. That was one of the companies that is currently working for us to do the water-main replacement.

Of course next year and every year following we actually have to have some sort of work being done. We are now in the process of getting some information to the City of Atlantic City and working in conjunction with them to do some water-main replacement and I will let Mike talk a little bit more about that aspect of it,

but we are proactively doing work on a consistent basis.

Mr. Armstrong: We were just contacted by the City because there are some funds available.

Mr. Devlin: That was my next question.

2.4

Mr. Armstrong: It goes to the City, but they see money allocated for water, but they have to go through us to get the money because it benefits both us and we are talking potentially millions that we will have in savings and they will have in savings and here is why.

The money because it has to go through the City they can't get it because it is earmarked for water so they have to utilize us to replace our pipes, but the City will not have to pay those fees because the money will account for replacement of the pipes and also pay you.

So they contacted us and we had at least two meetings with them. They are going to use their grant writer whose going to get the funds, and get the application in ahead of time. We just have to coordinate with them. These are the streets we are coordinate with and they are going to make it happen in terms of the money.

So we are talking millions of dollars in savings for us and million of dollars in saving for the City and that is one. While I had him I spoke to the grant

writer and I heard that he is really good Tim Vertullo (sic) and I talked to Anthony Swan and I said we want you to find money for us for PFAS as well.

2.4

So we may be coming back for a separate proposal to do that next month because I also provided him with two other links related to money that is earmarked for water utilities authority and an infrastructure.

And two, there is a bill that has passed congress for over a billion dollars and it is earmarked just for PFAS. So when it goes to the senate it is likely that it will pass and he sees that as being a benefit to the City. Maybe we can fix other roads as well, but I doubt it because it is mostly PFAS related, but maybe he will help us in that regard.

I think what has happened to be honest with you initially they said they were going to package it together, and then they came back and said that he would give us a separate code and the reason for that is that the City does not benefit from PFAS and it does not mean that you open up any roads and why should the City have the expense of utilizing his service.

Mr. Hill: Just to back up. Well, not back up, but to solidify what Claude just said the grant writer that he is speaking about is a member of MBCA and will be at that dinner we just talked about. He has done amazing

work for the City of Atlantic City and Mr. Gonzalez probably knows Jim R and the association and he is very good. MBCA is one of the groups that writes letters of support for his projects, if it is Duck Town or Mid Town which is a big project going on that we are involved in.

2.4

Now, we would do the same thing for the MUA and the water. So he is very very successful most of the time and I am sure Mr. Gonzalez would agree. I mean, he can't guarantee every single grant, but if indeed that happens and we use him I just know that he has been very successful for the Atlantic City recently.

In fact he just got money grant for ACCC for their big project that they are doing this month for the wind station at the training center. That would be great if we could pull him in and use him.

Mr. Bor: So essentially the City pulls him in and once approved by the City they have to develop a mechanism to get it to us.

They have been ignoring court orders and they have been essentially lying to the court and this has caused quit a stir, as you might expect. Just so you know in terms of the content of this, at this point right now, there are four million documents that have been presented in discovery totaling about 27 million pages of discovery. The firm is flying down there and it is about time.

Let's back up for a second. I told you about 3M and how they got involved with PFAS 35 or 40 years ago. They lied about their research. They hired a prominent chemist to go around the country saying there was research done and it is perfectly fine. He was on the payroll and these guys are dirty guys. We know that

Dupont has spun off corporations to avoid liability.

They have taken the patents for PFAS and put it in new corporations so when we hit them we see essentially no assets, but the point is this, now, this has been a very well run and choreograph piece of litigation. The guys that we work with in California they have one hundred people that work with them to go through and read all of this stuff. Okay.

This is a massive undertaking. The point is this once this comes together and it will. Once we determine that they lied to the court and misrepresented what they were supposed to do. Once things get squared away things are going to start to move and we can start looking at some number that can finance what we are talking about.

I am sitting back here and listening and I am sweating bullets because I am thinking we have to come up with 25 or 30 million dollars; right.

Mr. Armstrong: Claude says 50.

Mr. Riley: So we have a lot money that we have to be able to generate and everything was going smoothly up until literally three weeks ago when they were determined that they were flat out lying.

So it is moving along and once the judge straightens out this mess and it is a funny thing when you read his transcripts of the meeting, and I listened to a number of them, he has that soft South Carolina accent. So you think he is an okay guy until he let's loose on somebody. Okay, but in any event I wanted to bring you up to speed on that because I have said in the past that discovery is on going and the train is off the tract and it has to be straighten out.

I also have provided a brief summary of the budget along with complete budget which is almost 70 to 80 pages there in the board package.

The 2022 budget reflects Total Revenue of \$16.9 million and total appropriation of \$17.6 million including \$737 thousand to the municipal appropriation to the City.

Out total anticipated revenue for 2022 is \$16.9 million, which is about 8.5% increase as compared to 2021.

The total operating expenses amount to about \$14.7 million, and non-operating expenses are anticipated to be about 2.9 million.

The non-operating expense includes, as again mentioned, municipality appropriation payment to the City, which is about 5% of our total operating appropriations, as mentioned before the amount is \$737 thousand.

This also includes renewal and replacement reserve, which is estimated at \$2 million. And that \$2 million we will definitely need to utilize for our capital projects.

The 2022 Rates are attached to the budget. We are

proposing about a 5% increase in flat rate and a 2% increase in excess rate. Obviously, we were hesitant to increase it, but this is really necessary for the capital improvement costs which the main one we do is PFAS.

A residential flat fee will increase by \$1.05 a quarter from \$62.25 per quarter that was the 2021 flat fee and it will go up \$65.50 per quarter and that is per unit.

So any water usage exceeding 2500 cubic feet per quarter, that is the allowance for our customers, will be charged at \$3.837 per 100 cubic feet for residential customers and also the access rate is also \$2.837 for all businesses and customers as well.

From this increase we are, we will generating addition revenue of \$534.000 from the 2022 annual rate increase. We also expect an increase in 10% in water usages especially as the businesses were not quite open and they are opening at full capacity.

Any variances over and under 10% for each appropriation budget line time are explained on Page N-1 in the budget document. Those are all explained in those pages there. The good news is our outstanding principal balance on the Authority's debt is about \$7 million, and the outstanding interest balance is about

\$495 thousand. We have made our last payment on the 1 2 2012 Refunding Bond this year, and also this year, we recently refinanced our 2007 Bond Series. Therefore, 3 4 our ratings are withdrawn since the Authority rate bonds 5 are no longer outstanding. We only have four loans with the New Jersey Infrastructure Bank and a private loan 6 7 with Fulton Bank. Hopefully, this will provide a positive direction for us when we have borrowing or 8 9 bonding for our major capital projects in 2022. 10 So now the Capital budget, obviously, this year 11 capital budget for 2022 is projected to be \$43 million 12 800 hundred thousand. That is quite a lot. 13 As we all know the Authority is facing challenges 14 for PFAS regulation. We expect the cost for the 15 upgrades of our treatment plant to reduce or remove PFAS 16 contamination somewhere between 30-50 million. 17 already started a short-term remedy to treat PFAS --18 Mr. Hill: She just froze.
