- 3 Number one, we're going to be looking
- 4 at a lot of money today, and some things are
- 5 emergency, but we've been working on these -- these
- 6 issues for quite a long time. It will be good to
- 7 get them moving forward, so just so everybody's
- 8 aware of that. We're get into those details later.
- 9 Also, I wanted to wish board members
- 10 and our community Happy Ramadan month. I believe it
- 11 starts or started, so I hope it's a good celebration
- 12 month for all.
- 13 Okay.
- MR. DEDAR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 15 MR. KAUSAR: Thank you. Yes. Thank
- 16 you, Mr. Chairman.
- 17 CHAIRMAN HILL: Of course. Of
- 18 course.
- 19 And now we're going to go to Mr.
- 20 Ward, and I know, Mr. Ward, you have things to
- 21 always give us an uplifting moment in executive
- 22 session.
- 23 But is there anything you'd like to
- 24 put in public at this moment?
- 25 MR. WARD: Other than the fact that



- 1 there are at least one, maybe two requests for
- 2 relief of connection fees, and I have approved them
- 3 to go into closed session.
- 4 CHAIRMAN HILL: Exactly. Amazing
- 5 what the front page of The Press will do. We'll
- 6 move on for that later. Okay.
- 7 MR. WARD: Uh-huh.
- 8 CHAIRMAN HILL: Engineering
- 9 committee, we did meet again. We had a full -- full
- 10 house there, and we had one of our -- one of the
- 11 leading partners of Remington & Vernick part of that
- 12 for half of the agenda. Lots and lots of projects
- 13 happening.
- 14 We're going to get into most of those
- 15 specifics, in particular the emergency things, later
- 16 on in the agenda, so we might -- why review them
- 17 now? But we did have a good meeting, lots of good
- 18 things happening there. We have a great
- 19 partnership, and I always am very grateful when they
- 20 send out our operations and our engineering reports,
- 21 because again, it gives the board opportunities to
- 22 see where we are tentatively and -- money-wise and
- 23 project-wise and contract-wise. So please make sure
- 24 you review them.
- Does anybody from engineering, Mr.



- 1 Eccles, Remington, Mr. Keen, do you want to say
- 2 anything now, or do you want to wait until we get to
- 3 the issues?
- 4 MR. KEEN: We should probably wait
- 5 until we're at that part of the agenda.
- 6 CHAIRMAN HILL: I would assume.
- 7 Mr. Eccles, do you agree?
- 8 MR. ECCLES: Oh, yes. Yes. I agree
- 9 with that. We'll deal with each issue as it comes
- 10 up.
- 11 CHAIRMAN HILL: Exactly. Lots of
- 12 information.
- Okay. We'll move on to personnel.
- 14 Mr. Dedar? I don't know -- I believe you met. I'm
- 15 not sure. I always think you're --
- 16 MR. DEDAR: Yes, Mr. Chairman. We
- 17 don't -- we don't have anything for personnel yet.
- 18 We don't have any meetings, so...
- 19 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. And I know
- 20 we're going to be talking --
- 21 MR. DEDAR: Yeah. We don't have
- 22 any --
- 23 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. We'll be
- 24 talking about the deputy executive position a little
- 25 bit later.



- 1 MR. DEDAR: Correct. Yes. Yes.
- 2 Yes.
- 3 CHAIRMAN HILL: And we did have some
- 4 good movement on that since our last meeting, so
- 5 we'll get to that a little bit later.
- MR. DEDAR: Awesome.
- 7 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. Our executive
- 8 director, Ms. Still, has been busy, busy. I had a
- 9 sit-down meeting with her about three weeks ago.
- 10 She and I and Cliff, I think, we had a meeting with
- 11 the state, as well, with some issues, and she's not
- 12 going to go into all of that now, but publically,
- 13 India, would you like to speak a little bit about
- 14 some of the things?
- 15 MS. STILL: Yes. Good morning,
- 16 everyone. It's been an interesting first month here
- 17 as the executive director. I've supplied you with
- 18 just a little synopsis of -- of some of the things
- 19 that I've been looking at.
- 20 And yeah. We have done quite a bit
- 21 of trainings this past month just beefing up the
- 22 areas on the harassment and discrimination and also
- 23 purchasing, so I'm just looking forward to
- 24 continuing doing more of that, as well as thinking
- 25 about ways that we can improve technology here and



- 1 just address some of the future-oriented challenges
- 2 that we have, even with labor.
- 3 So if you have any questions, you
- 4 know, I just gave you a brief synopsis there. I'm
- 5 not sure how that will play out in the future,
- 6 whether it will change, but I'm just giving you an
- 7 idea of what it's been like so far.
- 8 CHAIRMAN HILL: And, India, I believe
- 9 you sent that to Mr. Swain, too, right, that list?
- MS. STILL: Yes.
- 11 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. You did?
- 12 MS. STILL: I'm sorry. You said
- 13 Swan? Mr. Swain?
- 14 CHAIRMAN HILL: Wes. Wes.
- MS. STILL: Oh, Swain?
- 16 CHAIRMAN HILL: Swain. Swain.
- MS. STILL: Okay. Because I'm
- 18 thinking --
- 19 CHAIRMAN HILL: Wes Swain, Swan.
- 20 You knew who I mean. Right, Wes?
- 21 MS. STILL: Right. Yeah. He should
- 22 have gotten that, as well.
- 23 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. This is the
- 24 first time we've gotten something like this
- 25 comprehensively written down to our board, which is



- 1 something new for this director, and I think that's
- 2 kind of good.
- 3 I particularly -- we had a long
- 4 discussion about her training session with
- 5 management, and I know she's going to work on the
- 6 next one with staff, too, but that was very
- 7 interesting to see. A lot of the things not
- 8 surprising on there. A lot of things interesting to
- 9 us to look at, and I'm sure Mr. Riley's glad that
- 10 we've covered or are starting to work on some of the
- 11 labor issues, and I know we're working with the
- 12 state on that, so...
- 13 MS. STILL: Yeah. We have a
- 14 managers' lunch today, so we're -- that's going to
- 15 continue to happen on a -- on a monthly basis
- 16 where --
- 17 CHAIRMAN HILL: Oh, okay.
- MS. STILL: To follow up --
- 19 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay.
- 20 MS. STILL: -- on the retreat.
- 21 CHAIRMAN HILL: That's great. Super.
- 22 Well, good job, India, for that. Thank you.
- 23 And if any board member has a
- 24 question on what she sent on that, you can reach out
- 25 to her personally. We don't need to do that now.



- 1 Okay. Anything else, India, for now?
- 2 I know you have other things in closed.
- 3 MS. STILL: No. That's -- that's it.
- 4 Thank you.
- 5 CHAIRMAN HILL: That's what I
- 6 thought.
- 7 Okay. Our very busy man Cliff Keen
- 8 has a lot of things going on as the deputy executive
- 9 director of operations.
- 10 Again, I mentioned the engineering
- 11 and operator's report, that he works along with our
- 12 consultants. Please, please review that. I keep
- 13 saying that every month.
- 14 Would you like, Cliff, to speak now
- 15 on any of that, or do you want to wait -- there
- 16 might be one or two items we're not going to get to,
- 17 but...
- MR. KEEN: Yeah. I mean, I think the
- 19 reports kind of speak for themselves, and I think
- 20 I'll reserve most of my time to speaking on the
- 21 issues that we have in front of us today, if that's
- 22 okay.
- 23 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right, because I have
- 24 your name on a couple of those sheets, those
- 25 resolutions.



- 1 MR. KEEN: Yes.
- 2 CHAIRMAN HILL: Just a few questions.
- 3 So great. They also -- India and Cliff did attend a
- 4 conference this week.
- 5 Can you just tell us what that was
- 6 just so the rest of the board is aware?
- 7 MR. KEEN: Sure. We -- this week was
- 8 the American Waterworks Association conference.
- 9 That's where a lot of industry leaders, consultants,
- 10 engineers, the -- all the vendors that are out
- 11 there, and especially the larger systems, get
- 12 together and collaborate and discuss some of the big
- 13 issues facing water and wastewater for the next, you
- 14 know, year.
- 15 And we also attended the AEA, really
- 16 a day at the AEA and then a little bit of the
- 17 morning session. A lot of it has to do with PFAS,
- 18 things that we're already working on. We're looking
- 19 at the future that includes microplastics and
- 20 lithium and all of these other short-chain PFAS that
- 21 are -- that are going to definitely change the
- 22 industry a little bit, and there's been recent
- 23 attention on operator licensing and training and
- 24 trying to get younger people into the industry sort
- 25 of nationwide. That's important. But especially



- 1 here in New Jersey, there are just not enough
- 2 people, and it's increasing the rates which, you
- 3 know, in some ways is good and in some ways is very
- 4 hard, you know, to work with.
- 5 So that's -- that's, you know,
- 6 another thing that we've been kind of trying to make
- 7 sure that we're -- we're on the cutting edge of and
- 8 can adequately staff the positions that we need.
- 9 MS. STILL: I'd like to add that one
- 10 of my chief concerns is the cybersecurity, and so --
- 11 and that's taking front and center now. So I will
- 12 be working closely with Patrick Quinlan on
- 13 cybersecurity issues, so you're --
- 14 CHAIRMAN HILL: Yeah. He's --
- 15 MS. STILL: -- going to be hearing a
- 16 lot about that just in the national papers.
- 17 CHAIRMAN HILL: Yeah. He's good.
- MS. STILL: Okay.
- 19 CHAIRMAN HILL: He's great. Pat's a
- 20 good guy to work with.
- 21 MR. KEEN: As well as our SCADA
- 22 operators, too. I mean, that's -- that's the
- 23 other sort of side --
- 24 CHAIRMAN HILL: We're all done with
- 25 SCADA now? We did all of that; right?



- 1 MR. KEEN: Yeah. Well...
- 2 CHAIRMAN HILL: I get -- it's so
- 3 complicated with SCADA. Are we done with them? Not
- 4 done with them, but I mean, we're all up to date now
- 5 with it?
- 6 MR. KEEN: We're working on it.
- 7 There's always going to be issues.
- 8 MS. STILL: Yeah.
- 9 CHAIRMAN HILL: The answer was yes.
- 10 No.
- MS. STILL: Yes. We're good.
- 12 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. I'm kidding.
- 13 I'm kidding. I'm sorry.
- 14 Okay. Very good. C on our agenda,
- 15 of course, we don't have an executive director of
- 16 administration, but just for everybody to be aware
- 17 of, after some consultation with our state partner
- 18 and India, we are ready -- and our chairman Mr.
- 19 Dedar, I believe we're going to be ready to go out
- 20 pretty soon. Ms. Still has worked on a
- 21 comprehensive job description adding some things.
- 22 Do you want to say something about
- 23 that now, India? Because it does affect us all.
- 24 MS. STILL: Yeah. I still have to
- 25 chat with Wes, so I -- it's not final. If anybody



- 1 has --
- 2 CHAIRMAN HILL: No. No.
- 3 MS. STILL: -- the last draft, it's
- 4 not final yet, but it should be soon.
- 5 CHAIRMAN HILL: And we're trying to
- 6 get somebody comprehensively that will be able to
- 7 assist because there's so many tasks that hopefully
- 8 our director, we'll be able to give them, he or she
- 9 or whoever it is.
- 10 We again will advertise. We again
- 11 will have a time frame. We again will have a search
- 12 committee, which I already announced, so we'll move
- 13 forward as soon as it's ready to go.
- 14 And I know the state will do a final
- 15 review of that job description, as per requested.
- 16 Right? Okay? Good.
- Okay. Money. So we're at Ms. Tharp,
- 18 accounting and finance. As always, your reports are
- 19 great. Thank you for the follow-up to the bills.
- 20 And we'll go from there.
- 21 Anita?
- 22 MS. THAPA: Okay. So the financial
- 23 reports are for the month of January, which is
- 24 included in the packets obviously. And as of
- 25 January, we recorded the revenue from the user



- 1 charges, about 1.5 million, which is about 3 percent
- 2 than -- less than what we anticipated in our 2024
- 3 budget.
- 4 Expenses were in January -- in
- 5 January we spent about 932,000 -- 932,000.
- And as for the cash management, we
- 7 are earning -- interest is a little bit down on our
- 8 trustee account, which is about 4.9 -- 99, almost 5
- 9 percent. But, however, in the cash management, with
- 10 the New Jersey Cash Management, we are earning 5.32
- 11 percent.
- 12 So I'm kind of thinking maybe in a
- 13 couple months I'm trying to -- probably going to
- 14 move some of the money from our trustee to our --
- 15 the New Jersey Cash Management Fund.
- 16 CHAIRMAN HILL: Uh-huh.
- 17 MS. THAPA: Okay? As for the balance
- 18 adjustment, that's just for the review, and the
- 19 shutoff, which will be -- we are going to start
- 20 probably the first week of April. It also
- 21 depends -- I know the weather is crazy. Some days
- 22 it's very cold. Some days it's not. So we would
- 23 like to start shutoffs starting the first week of --
- 24 in April, which is coming.
- 25 CHAIRMAN HILL: I always thought it



- 1 was like the middle of April or the first week.
- 2 Yeah. Uh-huh.
- 3 MS. THAPA: Yes.
- 4 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.
- 5 MS. THAPA: Uh-huh. Yep. That's
- 6 about it on my report.
- 7 If you have any question, as usual,
- 8 please feel free to reach out to me.
- 9 CHAIRMAN HILL: Anybody right now
- 10 have a question?
- 11 Again, please review those documents.
- 12 They're very helpful.
- We're moving on to new business, and
- 14 we start off with our unnecessary to appear. Again,
- 15 I believe there's four -- yeah. There's four people
- 16 that are requesting abatements. And we can do all
- 17 of them together.
- 18 If -- again, just a reminder to a
- 19 board member, if there's a conflict you want to
- 20 recuse yourself from one of them, when we vote, just
- 21 point that one out, please.
- 22 So let's read them together, and
- 23 we'll vote. We'll -- we'll move from there.
- Ms. Johnson, can we do 11 a?
- MS. JOHNSON: Okay. Abatements.



- 1 Six-month interest free payment plan for H. Camper
- 2 located at 638 Green Street. The dollar amount is
- 3 \$311.38. They're asking for a six-month interest
- 4 plan of paying \$62.32 a month for the next six
- 5 months.
- The next one is a regular abatement
- 7 for 37 North Trenton Avenue for Ricky Hoan in the
- 8 amount of \$284.14.
- 9 The next abatement is for One Ten
- 10 Squire, LLC located at 37 North Massachusetts Avenue
- 11 in the amount of \$1,181.64.
- 12 Lastly, abatement for a 12-month
- 13 interest free payment plan for Verna Peak located at
- 14 712 Robinson Avenue in the amount of \$3,467.06 with
- 15 a 12-month interest plan of \$298.66 for 12 months.
- 16 CHAIRMAN HILL: The interest plan or
- 17 the -- the help with an interest plan has been done
- 18 in the past many times for people who do not know
- 19 that.
- But, Anita, could you just comment on
- 21 what -- what that means for us?
- 22 MS. THAPA: The interest free plan,
- 23 obviously, there's a leak; right? The amount is a
- 24 little bit high, and the customer requests for
- 25 monthly interest payment plan because obviously,



- 1 they couldn't afford it. That's what their request
- 2 is for, and always -- we don't put any penalty on
- 3 the balance for whatever the amount -- I mean,
- 4 whatever the month we offer them.
- 5 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.
- 6 MS. THAPA: Which is six month in
- 7 that case in one account and another one is --
- 8 CHAIRMAN HILL: A year.
- 9 MS. THAPA: -- a year.
- 10 CHAIRMAN HILL: A year, right.
- But I just wanted people to know we
- 12 do -- we have done this in the past. If you have a
- 13 problem with that, then you -- you have to vote
- 14 separately on that one. Okay?
- Any questions on that?
- 16 Hearing none, we'll accept a motion.
- MR. DEDAR: Motion.
- MS. DAVIES: Motion.
- 19 CHAIRMAN HILL: Thank you.
- 20 And a second? I quess Stephanie's
- 21 second. Thank you.
- Okay. Roll call.
- MS. JOHNSON: Mr. Hill?
- 24 CHAIRMAN HILL: Yes.
- MS. JOHNSON: Mr. Dedar?



- 1 MR. DEDAR: Yes.
- 2 MS. JOHNSON: Ms. Langford?
- 3 MS. LANGFORD: Yes.
- 4 MS. JOHNSON: Mr. Eccles?
- 5 MR. ECCLES: Yes.
- MS. JOHNSON: Ms. Davies?
- 7 MS. DAVIES: 11 a (1) I abstain, and
- 8 the rest of them, yes.
- 9 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. Thank you,
- 10 Stephanie. Yep. That's what you're supposed to do.
- 11 The next thing is another job for
- 12 Cliff, hopefully maybe not forever, but we do need
- 13 to do this and put this position there because we do
- 14 spend so much money. We have contracts. We need
- 15 people to look at those things.
- 16 We're lucky enough to have Cliff as a
- 17 QPA, so let's read the resolution first, and then
- 18 we'll discuss.
- MS. JOHNSON: Appointing Clifford
- 20 Keen as the authority's qualified purchasing agent.
- 21 Whereas, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-9 and
- 22 N.J.A.C 5:32-4.4 sets forth and establishes the
- 23 criteria for a qualified purchasing agent;
- 24 Whereas, the N.J.S.A. 40A:11-9
- 25 authorizes the public body of the authority to



- 1 appoint a qualified purchasing agent;
- Whereas, Cliff Keen, QPA, possesses
- 3 the experience, training, and designation of a
- 4 qualified purchasing agent as issued by the director
- 5 of the Division of Local Government Services.
- Now therefore be it resolved, by the
- 7 ACMUA board in open public session on this day,
- 8 March 22nd, hereby appoints Cliff Keen QPA as the
- 9 MUA's qualified purchasing agent.
- 10 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. India, do you
- 11 want to speak about what you and I spoke about?
- MS. STILL: Yes. Sure. So we have
- 13 the ability to appoint someone for the position in a
- 14 temporary -- on a temporary basis. It could
- 15 actually be any member of the staff. And when --
- 16 this is -- in the administrative code, when you lose
- 17 your QPA, you can continue for an additional year
- 18 with a temporarily appointed individual.
- Now, we're lucky that Cliff actually
- 20 has the QPA license. You know, we didn't really
- 21 want to do this to Cliff because he has --
- 22 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.
- 23 MS. STILL: -- so many things
- 24 already, but I'll tell you two things. One, finding
- 25 a qualified purchasing agent is really difficult.



- 1 We did reach out to the ACUA, and they're -- they
- 2 can't handle the additional capacity.
- 3 This, for us, is also needed because
- 4 we have two staff -- two staff persons who are
- 5 training to be QPAs, but they won't be able to sit
- 6 for the license unless we can show that they've had
- 7 practical on-the-job training.
- 8 So we have put in place already some
- 9 mechanisms so that they can begin to get that
- 10 training. And they are doing it under -- they'll be
- 11 doing it under the auspices of Cliff's license.
- In addition, I've also asked all of
- 13 the staff who are involved in any purchasing
- 14 function to attend a course with the New Jersey
- 15 Start. It's actually a vendor that runs the -- the
- 16 state's state purchasing system.
- 17 And there was a -- there was a mass
- 18 training. About a week ago 10 of our employees
- 19 participated in that, and then we're going to follow
- 20 up with two specialized trainings, one, again,
- 21 virtual and then one in person with that
- 22 organization just to make sure that anybody that's
- 23 involved in the purchasing function understands the
- 24 state contract system.
- Now, most of our purchases are either



- 1 through the state contract system and -- or they're
- 2 below our threshold. So, you know, this is a -- a
- 3 good temporary solution. You know, we're just going
- 4 to -- and we'll keep looking for somebody, you know,
- 5 with a QPA license. And hopefully something will
- 6 come -- come about or one of our staff members will
- 7 be able to move into that spot.
- 8 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. And I -- I
- 9 want to thank Cliff for stepping up here at this
- 10 time for this, and I'm really excited to see the two
- 11 staff members at least interested in trying it.
- 12 That's great. Internally is always better than
- 13 externally.
- 14 However, we are going to be including
- 15 that in the deputy director's outreach, not that
- 16 they need it, but it would be preferred. And I
- 17 think that came from the state or India. I forget.
- 18 But anyway, so we are trying to deal with the
- 19 situation, but we do need to move forward on that.
- 20 So anybody else have a question? If
- 21 not, I'll move this resolution.
- 22 Can we have a second?

- 5 spending some money. A lot of hard work has gone
- 6 into these proposals, these --
- 7 Bless you. Bless you.
- MS. JOHNSON: Thank you. Sorry.
- 9 CHAIRMAN HILL: A lot of hard work
- 10 from Remington & Vernick, from Cliff, from Anita,
- 11 India. So it's vital that we look ahead and move
- 12 forward.
- One of our biggest projects is our
- 14 lead service line replacement system where we're
- 15 going to be working with the City, of course, as
- 16 well, because we don't want to do the work and then
- 17 tear up everything and redo it and then we have all
- 18 kinds of problems, as well as the I-Bank and looking
- 19 for some funding.
- 20 So let's do -- because the one is
- 21 almost the same, only it's two separate ones, let's
- 22 just first read Remington & Vernick -- well, the --
- 23 not them. But resolution 11 d (1), and then we'll
- 24 get some explanations.
- Go ahead.



- 1 MS. JOHNSON: Engineering services
- 2 for lead service line replacement Phase 1
- 3 construction management services.
- 4 Whereas, the Atlantic City MUA has
- 5 applied to the New Jersey Infrastructure Bank for
- 6 financing the project costs related to the lead
- 7 service line replacement project;
- 8 Whereas, the NJIB loan application
- 9 process requires the authority to enter into a
- 10 construction management agreement with the
- 11 engineering design firm to evaluate and coordinate
- 12 the work on Phase 1 for the engineering services for
- 13 lead service line replacement;
- 14 Whereas, the authority received from
- 15 Remington & Vernick Engineers a proposal to provide
- 16 services for the engineering services for lead
- 17 service line replacement Phase 1 construction
- 18 management services, and that proposal received from
- 19 Remington & Vernick is hereby accepted in the amount
- 20 of \$390,000.
- 21 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. But before we
- 22 do that, we really need for the rest of the board --
- 23 specifically, if you're not on engineering, you
- 24 should know a little bit more about this I think
- 25 before you vote.



- 1 So, Bob, do you want to speak about
- 2 this, why the number is there, the time frame, and
- 3 how I-Bank plays a role in this, if you could, or
- 4 Cliff?
- 5 MR. DENNIS: Well, so I can, Mr.
- 6 Chairman. Bob is in Disney World. I don't know how
- 7 much he'll be able to weigh in on this proposal,
- 8 but...
- 9 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. But, Ed -- oh,
- 10 there you are. Ed, okay. Great. Yeah. Disney
- 11 World, yeah. All I know is the tickets are
- 12 expensive there.
- MR. DENNIS: Exactly. So --
- 14 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay, Ed. Yeah.
- 15 Because you were part of this initial discussion in
- 16 the -- in our meeting, too. I think it's vital that
- 17 our board knows.
- 18 Go ahead. I'm sorry.
- 19 MR. DENNIS: I agree. This is
- 20 actually very exciting. So we are -- we are very
- 21 close to going out to bid and actually getting
- 22 shovels in the ground for our first phase of the
- 23 lead -- lead service line replacement program.
- 24 The -- as -- as the resolution
- 25 states, the I-Bank, who we are getting our funding



- 1 through for this project, requires full-time
- 2 construction management for their projects. So what
- 3 this proposal provides is really two -- two separate
- 4 things.
- 5 Number one -- and the big portion of
- 6 the cost for this is to have a full-time
- 7 construction observer on the project. They're --
- 8 you know, I would say unlike our typical capital say
- 9 water main projects and things like that, which do
- 10 require oversight, this is going to be a -- very
- 11 much a hand-holding exercise for this project.
- 12 And just to kind of zoom out -- and I
- 13 know everyone's aware of this, but this project will
- 14 entail not just replacing service lines in the
- 15 street, which we are accustomed to doing, but the
- 16 contractor will be replacing those service lines to
- 17 the houses and to the buildings, and so they will be
- 18 digging in people's yards, tearing up their
- 19 sidewalks and driveways. There's going to be a lot
- 20 of coordination required.
- The initial part of this work is
- 22 going to be to verify whether or not we actually
- 23 even need to replace the line, whether or not the
- 24 line -- because most of these lines are in the
- 25 unknown category. So there will need to be someone



- 1 there to verify and confirm whether or not a line is
- 2 or isn't lead or galvanized. If it's not lead or
- 3 galvanized, that needs to be verified and then taken
- 4 off the inventory list, and we obviously need to
- 5 keep very tight records for the purposes of that
- 6 part of this. So that's the big piece of this --
- 7 this cost, is having that person on site. And the
- 8 project is about a nine-month construction duration.
- 9 So we're going to have someone full time on site for
- 10 that entire duration while work is taking place.
- The other part of this is the
- 12 administrative part of managing the construction
- 13 contract. It's an I-Bank project, so there's a good
- 14 amount of documentation that is required just to
- 15 comply with their program requirements. On top of
- 16 that, what we expect is as we go through this
- 17 project, you know, we have a certain number of
- 18 service lines on the -- shown on the plans, but the
- 19 expectation is that as the contractor goes out there
- 20 and digs some of these up, a lot of them are not
- 21 going to need to be replaced.
- 22 What will happen then is we will then
- 23 be providing the contractor with alternate
- 24 locations. The idea is that if -- just for round
- 25 numbers, if this project ends up being a \$7 million



- 1 construction project, we want to make sure that we
- 2 spend that entire 7 million as part of this job so
- 3 that we can go as far as we can on Phase 1 and
- 4 replace as many service lines as we can and to take
- 5 advantage of the funding that's out there from
- 6 I-Bank while we have it.
- 7 So we will in the office, while the
- 8 work is taking place, be preparing plans for
- 9 alternate locations so that as the contractor moves
- 10 through the project, we will be supplying them with
- 11 additional engineering documents so they can move on
- 12 to the next location. So that, you know, we may end
- 13 up going through, you know, many more service lines
- 14 than are in the original project, but there's some
- 15 engineering involved with getting that done.
- 16 So it's -- there's a lot to --
- 17 there's a lot to be done in the construction phase.
- 18 But the good news is, and I'll just end on this, is
- 19 I believe that we are one of the first, if not the
- 20 first municipal utility authority in Atlantic and
- 21 Cape May County that will be putting shovels in the
- 22 ground for lead service line replacement, so we're
- 23 leading the way. And I think that's something to be
- 24 proud of and excited about to get this where --
- It's a daunting task, but we've got



- 1 to get it done.
- 2 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. And I know
- 3 Cliff's going to be monitoring, as well, but I loved
- 4 the attachment to the resolution. It really was
- 5 very specific on what we're asking Remington &
- 6 Vernick to do, and I hope some of you got to read
- 7 that. If not, when you have nothing to do, look
- 8 over that. You'll see how detailed that they
- 9 proposed that versus very vague, which I've seen
- 10 before.
- 11 So just quickly, one question, and
- 12 then I'll be quiet. There's other people. I-Bank,
- 13 so what kind of money funding are we getting for
- 14 this? I have those notes somewhere else.
- 15 MR. DENNIS: Phase 1 -- Phase 1,
- 16 which we are targeting fiscal year 2024 funding --
- 17 and that's why this is time sensitive, because we
- 18 really need to get out to bid as soon as possible,
- 19 and they won't let us go out to bid without a
- 20 construction management agreement.
- 21 So if we -- if we make the fiscal
- 22 year 2024 deadline, we're looking at 50 percent
- 23 principal forgiveness, so -- and then the other 50
- 24 percent are very attractive low interest loans.
- 25 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.



- 1 MR. DENNIS: So that is the general
- 2 funding breakdown.
- 3 CHAIRMAN HILL: And that's why this
- 4 is on the agenda now that we need to move forward to
- 5 get going.
- 6 Okay. Great. Thank you, Ed.
- 7 So, board members, or Mr. Eccles, in
- 8 particular, since you are on that committee, would
- 9 you like to share anything or add to this,
- 10 questions?
- 11 MR. ECCLES: No. I mean, I -- I
- 12 don't have any questions. You know, a lot of -- you
- 13 know, it had been discussed previously at the -- at
- 14 the committee meeting, and Ed has done an excellent
- 15 job at summarizing what the -- what the project is,
- 16 what we're -- what we're facing, and I am -- quite
- 17 frankly, I'm sharing in his enthusiasm. Let's --
- 18 let's get this moving. Let's get this done.
- 19 CHAIRMAN HILL: Exactly. Yeah. And
- 20 that's a great -- that's a great feather in our cap,
- 21 as he mentioned, for us being so proactive and
- 22 assertive with this, so that's great, and I -- I
- 23 know that the state will appreciate that, as well.
- 24 So hearing no other --
- MR. KEEN: Can I say one other thing?



- 1 I apologize.
- 2 CHAIRMAN HILL: No problem.
- 3 MR. KEEN: I just want to let you
- 4 know, too, that this -- this project itself provides
- 5 a unique opportunity for us to see the condition of
- 6 some of our distribution main that's been buried
- 7 for, you know, in some cases a hundred years, maybe
- 8 longer.
- 9 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.
- 10 MR. KEEN: And as we do this project,
- 11 we're also keeping an eye on the future, and we're
- 12 going to take samples of the mains as we pull them
- 13 out to install new service lines so that we can
- 14 actually identify which mains are in the worst
- 15 existing, you know, condition so that as we move
- 16 forward, we can group mains together and come up
- 17 with a distribution system replacement plan that
- 18 will hopefully serve us for the next 75 years or so.
- 19 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. And as Ed
- 20 mentioned and Cliff mentioned, us moving today for
- 21 the bid means we can then approve, which means then
- 22 we can get started for the summer season, so that's
- 23 kind of the time frame for anybody.
- 24 Anybody else have a question?
- 25 Hearing none -- I think we read it.

Can we read the resolution first?

MS. JOHNSON: Engineering services

- 1 engineering services.
- 2 Whereas, there was a need to evaluate
- 3 and coordinate the work on the Atlantic City MUA's
- 4 engineering services for lead service line
- 5 replacement Phase 1;
- 6 Whereas, the board of directors of
- 7 the MUA approved resolution 23-12 on January 18th,
- 8 2023 from Remington & Vernick to provide services
- 9 for engineering services for lead service line
- 10 replacement Phase 1. The total cost, 300 and --
- 11 315,000;
- 12 Whereas, the scope of lead service
- 13 line replacement Phase 1 was increased from 5
- 14 million to 10 million to include 223 system side
- 15 service lines and 961 property owner service side
- 16 from 237 system side and 237 property owner side
- 17 service lines to attempt to maximize the principal
- 18 forgiveness associated with the authority's funding
- 19 source;
- 20 Whereas, the board of directors
- 21 received from Remington & Vernick phase -- I'm
- 22 sorry -- engineering services for lead service line
- 23 replacement Phase 1 additional engineering services
- 24 in the total cost of \$130,000 as per the proposal.
- 25 Should it be necessary to move certain project work



- 1 from Phase 1 to a later project phase, the authority
- 2 will not incur additional engineering costs for
- 3 those services for which plans already exist.
- 4 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. A little bit
- 5 of an explanation. Again, what's that word
- 6 additional mean?
- 7 So could we have an explanation on
- 8 that?
- 9 MR. DENNIS: Sure. Yeah. Yeah.
- 10 Absolutely.
- 11 CHAIRMAN HILL: Thank you, Ed.
- MR. DENNIS: No. Really --
- Sure, of course. This proposal
- 14 really has three components to it. So the first,
- 15 just in plain English, is when we started this job
- 16 and putting the plans together for this first phase,
- 17 the original application we had with I-Bank was for
- 18 a \$5 million project. And once the principle
- 19 forgiveness kind of came into focus, we increased
- 20 the scope of this project to a \$10 million project.
- 21 So basically, the scope of it doubled, so there was
- 22 a little bit of additional engineering costs
- 23 involved there, but the other part of this is two
- 24 other components that I think are interesting and
- 25 will be beneficial to the City and to the authority.



- One is that we will be developing a
- 2 website for our customers to access and potentially
- 3 self-report what their service line material is. If
- 4 we have a good response to the outreach for that
- 5 website, what that will allow -- it will benefit the
- 6 property owner because they won't need to have a
- 7 contractor knocking on their door and potentially
- 8 digging up their property to determine if a pipe is
- 9 or isn't lead.
- 10 And then for us, of course, we don't
- 11 have to incur that cost to have our contractor go
- 12 out and do that verification work if we're able to
- 13 confirm it through self-reporting through this web
- 14 portal. So we've done this in other municipalities,
- 15 and you know, it will all come down to an outreach
- 16 effort, which we will help with as much as we can,
- 17 and we will also maintain that website, track the
- 18 responses, review what comes in, and make
- 19 recommendations on whether or not the information
- 20 that is provided to us -- us is I guess accurate
- 21 enough or reliable enough to -- to take that item on
- 22 or off our inventory.
- 23 So that is part of this, and then the
- 24 other part of this is without going into too much
- 25 detail, sort of the state of the art on these types



- 1 of projects as far as inventorying is as artificial
- 2 intelligence software kind of comes -- is emerging,
- 3 there is a software platform -- there's a number of
- 4 them out there that are generically referred to as
- 5 predicted modeling. And basically what that means
- 6 is as we go through these projects, we'll be able to
- 7 utilize this software to help us predict for future
- 8 phases what service lines are likely to be lead or
- 9 galvanized and what service lines are likely to not
- 10 be lead or galvanized.
- 11 That will allow us to prioritize, and
- 12 when we prioritize and focus on the service lines
- 13 that are likely to be lead in the future phases, we
- 14 will save on the cost of unnecessary test pits and
- 15 verification costs if we are focusing and targeting
- 16 those services that are very likely to be lead.
- 17 The other part of this is the DEP may
- 18 eventually come around to a point where they will
- 19 accept predicted modeling as an acceptable means to
- 20 confirm that a line is not lead or galvanized, and
- 21 then we would be able to take those services off our
- 22 inventory without incurring any additional cost. So
- 23 this is an investment. Like I said, it's kind of
- 24 state of the art on where the industry is going with
- 25 these types of projects, so we want to get that in



- 1 place so we can take advantage of it going forward.
- 2 CHAIRMAN HILL: Thank you. Two
- 3 things, though, I wanted to -- and I know the
- 4 website thing and that will work, but as India knows
- 5 and a lot of us know, a lot of our residents are
- 6 not -- do not have Internet access, blah, blah,
- 7 blah. So what is our step? What's our next way of
- 8 moving notices through our -- to our residents and
- 9 our customers, working with the City?
- 10 How do we want to do -- how are we
- 11 going to do that, India, or Cliff? How are we going
- 12 to notice other than the website?
- MS. STILL: I can speak a little bit
- 14 to that, so --
- 15 CHAIRMAN HILL: Thank you.
- 16 MS. STILL: -- we had a -- well,
- 17 actually, the DEP reached out to us I guess over a
- 18 year ago wanting to assist with --
- 19 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay.
- MS. STILL: -- the whole program, but
- 21 in particular, there's a whole community outreach
- 22 piece, and I just got word back from CDM Smith,
- 23 which is a vendor that the -- that has partnered
- 24 with the DEP, that their proposal to help us with
- 25 the community outreach portion has been approved.



- I have a meeting set up on Monday. I
- 2 have to talk to Cliff to get him involved with this,
- 3 but you know, we've -- we're already thinking about
- 4 how we can get boots on the ground. I talked to the
- 5 workforce development board. Maybe --
- 6 CHAIRMAN HILL: I was going to ask
- 7 you that.
- 8 MS. STILL: Yeah. Because they
- 9 have -- they get funding every year for summer
- 10 employment. For us, it's going to be really
- 11 important to move through the community
- 12 organizations, so going to the neighborhood
- 13 association meetings every month.
- 14 There's also a very active community
- 15 development group, neighborhood -- it's the NRDC,
- 16 Neighborhood Redevelopment Companies, they're
- 17 extremely active. The community organizations, like
- 18 the Bangladesh Community Organization, is extremely
- 19 active. They're going to be our main inroads, so
- 20 you know, this still has to be fleshed out, but the
- 21 community education piece is pretty big.
- 22 CHAIRMAN HILL: So will they help
- 23 fund that or they're just giving the support?
- 24 MS. STILL: So that's a good
- 25 question. I'll find out more, but --



- 1 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.
- MS. STILL: You know, I'll find out
- 3 more on Monday if there's funding available, but at
- 4 least the -- with respect to the summer employment
- 5 program, that's going to be fully funded youth,
- 6 and --
- 7 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.
- 8 MS. STILL: -- I think we can get a
- 9 lot -- we can get a lot of mileage out of that
- 10 program if it's -- if it's structured the right way,
- 11 and we're also probably going to add in an education
- 12 component or have to for the students, which will be
- 13 just introducing them to the -- as a pipeline into
- 14 water careers, so I think that will be --
- 15 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. Somebody else
- 16 had a question?
- Don't forget the CDC groups when we
- 18 do that. There's four or five of them
- 19 well-established now all over the area, all over the
- 20 city. I mean, I know we're going to be doing work
- 21 in those areas, Midtown, Ducktown, you know, so...
- MS. STILL: Right. And I just wanted
- 23 to point out I sat in on a webinar early in the
- 24 month on AI technology. And just to confirm what Ed
- 25 said with the AI technology, it's -- it's supposedly



- 1 less costly and also quicker to establish your
- 2 inventory this way. So it's -- it's good.
- 3 CHAIRMAN HILL: Very good. We're
- 4 moving on up. Very good.
- 5 Okay. So anybody else have a

- 5 forward. Our fleet, our vehicles get beat up all
- 6 the time. You see them around the city. They do a
- 7 lot of work, so we need to look at getting an
- 8 upgrade or at least our aging fleet replaced, so
- 9 that's what this resolution is about, obviously, so
- 10 let's read that first.
- 11 MS. JOHNSON: Purchasing program for
- 12 enterprise fleet management services in an amount
- 13 not to exceed \$200,000 per year for 11 vehicles.
- 14 Whereas, the Atlantic City Municipal
- 15 Utilities Authority is allowed to participate in
- 16 national purchasing cooperatives, which was enacted
- 17 into law permitting agencies to utilize national
- 18 purchasing cooperatives;
- 19 Whereas, the MUA has aging vehicle
- 20 fleets, which is becoming increasingly costly to
- 21 maintain;
- 22 Whereas, this program will allow a
- 23 cost savings for purchasing, ongoing repair, and
- 24 maintenance of at least \$400,000 over a 10-year
- 25 period;



- 1 Whereas, it is recommended that the
- 2 board of directors of the MUA approve the use of the
- 3 enterprise fleet management services for the use of
- 4 the MUA to upgrade the authority's aging fleet in
- 5 the amount not to exceed the sum of \$200,000.
- 6 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. I quess I
- 7 have one question. Who determines the need?
- 8 MR. KEEN: So --
- 9 CHAIRMAN HILL: I knew that was going
- 10 to be you.
- MR. KEEN: If you'll -- if you'll --
- 12 if you'll let me just expound on this. The --
- 13 currently what our -- I apologize. Currently what
- 14 our policy has been, and most municipalities and
- 15 utilities authorities do the same thing, we purchase
- 16 a vehicle and we run it into the ground, and over a
- 17 15 to 20-year life of a truck, we -- we do
- 18 everything we can to keep it maintained, keep it
- 19 going, and during that time period, the value of the
- 20 truck decreases to a point where it's worth a couple
- 21 hundred dollars when we get rid of it and it's cost
- 22 us thousands and thousands of dollars to keep
- 23 running.
- 24 There is a program, this enterprise
- 25 fleet management program, that looks at your trucks



- 1 in a different way than we're used to, looks at your
- 2 fleet in a different way than you're used to. The
- 3 idea here is that the trucks are constantly replaced
- 4 after a five-year period, and we sell them at a time
- 5 where we maximize the profit from selling the
- 6 vehicle.
- 7 So by doing that, we reduce not just
- 8 our -- our expenses on maintenance and -- and the --
- 9 you know, the time and materials it takes to -- to
- 10 do that maintenance, but we also reduce the gas
- 11 cost, as every year gas -- you know, every year in a
- 12 vehicle the gas gets worse, the gas mileage gets
- 13 worse on a vehicle, as well as every year that a new
- 14 vehicle comes out, it usually improves on the other
- 15 side. The technology improves to fix it a little.
- 16 We also have then a fleet that's
- 17 under five years old that looks great in the
- 18 community, that works well for our staff. We don't
- 19 have to worry about all the outages that are
- 20 associated with it. And also, the safety features
- 21 are currently upgraded as new vehicles and safety
- 22 features are -- come out in the industry.
- 23 So by doing a quick analysis of, you
- 24 know, what we need to spend, it looks like over the
- 25 next 10-year period very -- using a very



- 1 conservative number, we're at \$450,000 of savings
- 2 over a 10-year period with the idea that we sell our
- 3 vehicles as their value is at its peek after a
- 4 five-year period.
- 5 This is not a new program. This is
- 6 something that 200-plus authorities and
- 7 municipalities have been part of. It's a program
- 8 that Atlantic City has been using for the last
- 9 several years, and that is why their fleet looks so
- 10 nice as you drive around town and you see their
- 11 public works vehicles in pretty good condition.
- 12 We have 11 vehicles now that are
- 13 quite old, over 10 years old, and that would be the
- 14 first part of this. So that \$200,000 would be to
- 15 change out those first 11 vehicles, and as we move
- 16 forward, it's a lease/purchase option. We've
- 17 checked it -- we've checked with other people that
- 18 use it. It -- it almost sounds too good to be true,
- 19 but everybody that's using it is having a good
- 20 experience with it, and I just wanted to make sure
- 21 that we are looking for every way that we can to
- 22 save money now and in the future. And this is one
- 23 of those options for us it seems to make a lot of
- 24 sense.
- 25 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. It certainly



- 1 does. Thank you.
- 2 I did want to give a -- a shout out
- 3 to -- and forgive me. I don't remember his name.
- 4 Our mechanic who is amazing, I understand, at the
- 5 plant, and we're looking at trying to help him out a
- 6 little bit more. We talked about that in another
- 7 meeting.
- 8 What's his name, Cliff, that does
- 9 such an amazing job for us?
- 10 MR. KEEN: Fred.
- 11 CHAIRMAN HILL: What's his name?
- MR. KEEN: Fred --
- 13 CHAIRMAN HILL: Fred. That's it.
- 14 MR. KEEN: -- Harper (phon). Yeah.
- 15 And I want everyone to understand
- 16 that even though this program would get rid of the
- 17 need for a mechanic to work on vehicles, we have
- 18 more than enough equipment and generators and things
- 19 to keep a mechanic busy full time. So this is not
- 20 the removal of a staff member. This will not --
- 21 CHAIRMAN HILL: No.
- 22 MR. KEEN: -- amount to any removal.
- 23 It will free up his time to work on some of the
- 24 things that we really haven't done as much
- 25 maintenance as we need to be, which puts us into



- 1 those emergency contracts that are coming in in a
- 2 little bit. And -- and this will be --
- 3 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.
- 4 MR. KEEN: -- a positive thing for
- 5 everybody involved. And just so you know, he's been
- 6 part of this conversation, as well, so this is not
- 7 something he's blindsided by or anything.
- 8 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right.
- 9 MR. KEEN: He agrees this is a good
- 10 option.
- 11 CHAIRMAN HILL: Yeah. And that's why
- 12 I wanted to bring it up because I know that, you
- 13 know, yeah, we're going to get -- why do we need a
- 14 mechanic? Well, because of other things and a
- 15 lot -- and a lot of other things, and he's very
- 16 good, so...
- 17 All right. That's another topic. So
- 18 let's move forward. Anybody have a question?
- 19 Hearing none, let's -- I'll move
- 20 this.
- 21 Could we have a second?
- MR. ECCLES: I'll second.
- 23 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay.
- 24 And roll call.
- MS. JOHNSON: Mr. Hill?

- 1 Whereas, well number 20 no longer
- 2 operates because it has lost a significant amount of
- 3 pumping head;
- 4 Whereas, the deputy executive
- 5 director of operations has provided a letter
- 6 outlining the emergent need for the authority to
- 7 proceed with emergency repair and redevelopment of
- 8 well 20;
- 9 Whereas, the MUA solicited quotes
- 10 from A.C. Schultes for emergency repairs and
- 11 redevelopment of well 20 in the amount of \$56,559.
- 12 CHAIRMAN HILL: We have worked with
- 13 Schultes before. They're a very good, qualified
- 14 company. But, obviously, we need our wells to work.
- 15 This one isn't even working.
- So, Cliff, want to speak on this one?
- MR. KEEN: Sure. Absolutely. And
- 18 this is kind of both wells I think, the discussion.
- 19 It almost is the same problem for both wells. We
- 20 need to be in a position where these kind of things
- 21 aren't emergencies because we've planned to do the
- 22 maintenance for them.
- 23 Unfortunately, we haven't taken the
- 24 small steps that we need to take that we've recently
- 25 taken to -- to understand where our wells are and --



- 1 and how well they're -- they're being used. The
- 2 pumping head, the -- for these wells -- what this
- 3 means is that as you pump water, the aquifer that
- 4 the well is pulling from actually goes below the
- 5 pump and it can no longer pull water.
- I showed you all a video a few months
- 7 ago of another well we had redeveloped -- that was
- 8 well 17, I believe -- that had the same exact
- 9 problem, that the screens were clogged with 30 years
- 10 of debris, and they needed to be treated in order to
- 11 run efficiently. That's where these come in.
- 12 One cost is a little bit higher
- 13 because there's also some changes that need to be
- 14 made to the existing structure of the -- of the pump
- 15 and the way that it -- it works in the building
- 16 because --
- 17 CHAIRMAN HILL: That's 25? Because
- 18 that was a question for me on 25.
- 19 MR. KEEN: Yeah, that's 25. I think
- 20 that was --
- 21 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay.
- 22 MR. KEEN: -- \$30,000 more.
- 23 CHAIRMAN HILL: Exactly. That was a
- 24 question. Okay.
- MR. KEEN: That one had a different



- 1 configuration, and there needs to be actual physical
- 2 changes to the way that sits in order to make this
- 3 happen the right way and have it -- have it pump
- 4 efficiently. So that's where we are.
- In the future, the plan will be to
- 6 redevelop, you know, a well a year for several
- 7 years, and we should have a period where we don't
- 8 have to do it, and then we'll start that process
- 9 again, so these things don't come as an emergency.
- The truth is with these two wells not
- 11 producing, a well out because of an electrical
- 12 problem, our surface water sluice gate not being
- 13 completed yet -- we're working on all of these
- 14 projects. If we had another well go down, we are in
- 15 trouble, especially as the seasons get busy.
- 16 So we need to move on these as soon
- 17 as possible so that as May and June come, it's not
- 18 an issue for us to being able to provide the water
- 19 for our residents.
- 20 CHAIRMAN HILL: Right. These are --
- 21 these are vital repairs, so emergencies.
- MR. KEEN: Yes.
- 23 CHAIRMAN HILL: That's why they're on
- 24 here, guys, today in March so -- so we can get it
- 25 done.



- 1 Anita, I know you've signed off on
- 2 all of this basically, but we're good with the
- 3 emergency budget; right?
- 4 MS. THAPA: So far. This is just
- 5 March, though.
- 6 CHAIRMAN HILL: Thank you. Okay. I
- 7 know. You're right. This is only March, but...
- MR. KEEN: And just to let you know,
- 9 we had planned on doing two wells this year as part
- 10 of our budget, but --
- 11 CHAIRMAN HILL: Yeah.
- 12 MR. KEEN: -- when the testing report
- 13 came back and we're only talking a few weeks ago,
- 14 when the reports came back from A.C. Schultes, they
- 15 indicated that these are emergent, and you know,
- 16 this is -- this needs to be done now, these two
- 17 wells.
- 18 CHAIRMAN HILL: Okay. All right.
- 19 Questions? People can ask. I'm not
- 20 trying to run the meeting. Well, I am trying to run
- 21 the meeting, but I mean, just if there's anybody
- 22 that has a question?
- 23 Okay. Hearing none, we'll look for a
- 24 motion.

- 12 from A.C. Schultes for emergency repair and
- 13 redevelopment of well 25 in the amount of \$86,926.

- 16 on the other one. It makes sense to have them
- 17 there. They know what the deal is. That we all
